SALT Workshop

On Monday the 24th of February, the Supporting and Linking Tradeswomen (SALT) organisation visited Triabunna District School to provide a carpentry workshop for Year 7-10 girls. Fourteen students participated and were introduced to a variety of new equipment such as drop saws, hand saws, jigsaws and drills to create a caddy out of wood. While the girls were building, they were able to ask questions of the trainers about what it is like to be a female in the trade industry, particularly as there were a number of trades being represented such as painters, carpenters and builders.

It was fantastic to see the excitement on the girls faces as they tried out loud and scary equipment to create something themselves.





















Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra

On Tuesday, the 5th of April, 3 musicians from the **Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra** came to our school for an incursion. We welcomed Swansea Primary School students who joined us for the show. The science of music was presented to students in an engaging and interesting way, and we were treated to hearing world-class musicians playing tuba and flute.

After the performance, grades 4/5/6 worked with Mrs Wilson to remember key facts from the event and focus on developing inquiry questions from wonderings or curiosities after the show.

Here are some of the responses.

Grace: How many years does it take to be good enough to be in the symphony orchestra?

Hunter: Why are pianos used so much in songs? **Eli**: Is it hard work to play the instruments?

Alithiya: I remember there was a flute and a tuba and Lilly must have been scared to perform in front of us.

Isaac: I remember the tuba was best in the centre.

Riley E: How do they make the shape of a tuba? **Tyler:** A flute is a woodwind instrument.

Lucas: How do the musicians hold their breath and make the music for that long?

Catherine: Why is the flute always silver?


Christian: I remember that the lady playing the tuba was the best in the state. I wonder how they learnt to play so well and how the tuba is made.


Alexia: The flute was a high instrument and the tuba was a low instrument. Now I really want to play the flute and tuba!

Well done to all participants for their enthusiasm and effort. We look forward to celebrating even more achievements in the future!




